In 500 BCE in Ireland....2,500 years ago...500 years before Jesus, the people of Ireland were the Celts. They were farmers and herders whose calendar went from winter through the growing season and ended when the harvest was done. Their year officially ended on our October 31 with festivities. The new year began the next day, a day corresponding to November 1. This holiday was called Samhain (*pronounced SAH-wen*), the Celtic New Year.

Celts believed that, at Samhain, the souls of those who died during the year moved on to heaven. At Samhain, the souls made one last visit to their loved ones on earth. These were not scary; these were the souls of friends and relatives. Imagine if someone you knew and loved could come back for a one-night visit. You wouldn't be frightened of them. So, Celts set out food for them, to nourish them on their journey and celebrate their trip to heaven. They wore different clothes so that they wouldn't be recognized and thought to be among the dead and then lit their new fires to honor the dead and light their way.

So, the festival was certainly not about evil or terror or fear of death. It was about closing the old year, sending the spirits of loved ones on to their new life in heaven and lighting the new fire, a flame to mark new beginnings, new dreams, and new hopes for the year to come. They celebrated their community, as well as their unity with each other and with their past.

There were celebrations like Samhain honoring deceased loved ones all over the world for example Día de los Muertos or Day of the Dead, that predated Christianity. So as more and more people became Christians, they brought with them many of these little traditions to honor their loved ones. Even All Saints Day was based on so many little customs of remembrance that in the 8th century, Pope Gregory III dedicated a prayer chapel to All Saints on November 1st and then Pope Gregory IV asked King Louis, the Pious, to declare that as official throughout the Holy Roman Empire thus, forever combing and raising up all the separate customs into Tradition for Western Christianity.

So, October 31st was really about All Saints- the All Hallows Eve to celebrate all those holy men and women who came before us to show the way. People even dress differently or dressed up like their favorite saints to honor them.

Then there is November 2nd All Souls Day. This is another grand example of how the faith and customs of all the people developed into a huge Christian Tradition. Even during the Mass and in special devotional prayers, we pray for all the souls in Purgatory which through time and in practically all areas of the world had customs to honor our deceased loved ones still making the journey Home.

As we celebrate, let's remember why the ancient Irish people began this holiday, namely to celebrate new beginnings and new hopes, and to entrust the souls of their loved ones to God with this Triduum of Remembrance from All Hallows Eve, through All Saints Day concluding with All Souls Day in one continuous celebration.

As the ancient Celts sent the souls of their loved ones home to God, let us continue that tradition by saying a prayer for them: Eternal rest Grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. Amen.

SCRIPTURE READINGS: THE 30TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



First Reading ~ Sirach 35: 12-14, 16-18

The Book of Sirach was written by a wise teacher who lived 200 years before Christ. It is a loose collection of thoughts on various concerns in the life of a believer. In today's selection, Sirach describes how God relates to us, and how we are to relate to God.

Second Reading ~ 2 Timothy 4: 6-8, 16-18

Today we hear the concluding lines of the second letter to Timothy. This letter was written in Paul's name sometimes after his death. Today's passage depicts Paul's thoughts while he was in prison, awaiting martyrdom.

Gospel ~ Luke 18: 9-14

The self-righteous and judgmental people in today's parable are being taught that they, like the Pharisee, do not really pray and are not in right relationship with God, even though they think they are. If, when we read this parable, we say, "Thank God I am not like that Pharisee," then the parable is directed just as much at us as it is at Jesus' original audience.
